# ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY

Over the past year, beginning in April 2025, following the devastating 7.7 magnitude earthquake that struck Myanmar on 28 March 2025, Promise Aid (PmA) has delivered a coordinated package of life-saving humanitarian assistance and early recovery support to some of the most vulnerable communities. Our response prioritized critical sectors including water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), food security, shelter, child protection, and livelihoods, implemented in close partnership with affected communities and local stakeholders.

With the generous support of donors, PmA successfully improved access to safe water for 219 households through the installation of a 2,000-foot gravity-fed water pipeline and community storage system in a remote highland village. This intervention has significantly reduced water insecurity and improved daily living conditions for beneficiary communities.

Complementing this effort, hygiene promotion activities and sanitation support were delivered to reduce public health risks in displacement and crisis-affected areas. Likewise, we built semi-permanent latrines and provided hygiene training in displacement camps to improve sanitation and prevent disease.

In the shelter sector, PmA provided repair support to 8 vulnerable households and 1 community hall, enabling families to restore safe and dignified living conditions following earthquake-related damage. These targeted interventions prioritized the most at-risk households, including those headed by women, elderly individuals, and persons with limited resources.

In parallel, our teams organized community kitchens that served balanced, hot meals to children in crisis settings and ran child-safe space programs to raise awareness of personal safety and protection.

37 households, including 60 children, received emergency food assistance, ensuring access to essential nutrition during the immediate aftermath of the crisis. Community-based support mechanisms, including shared food distribution and outreach, helped stabilize vulnerable families during a critical period.

PmA also maintained a strong focus on child protection and awareness. A total of 87 children participated in hygiene promotion sessions, received essential hygiene kits, and benefited from mine risk awareness education, equipping them with life-saving knowledge and practices to protect themselves in a hazardous and unstable environment.

In support of early recovery and livelihoods, we delivered climate-smart farming training and distributed improved seeds and organic fertilizers to 35 women farmers, bolstering household food security. These interventions promoted climate-resilient farming practices, strengthened local food production, and contributed to longer-term household resilience.

The impact of these integrated interventions is evident across target communities. Households now have improved access to safe drinking water, vulnerable families are living in safer shelters, children are better protected and informed, and farmers are more capable of sustaining their livelihoods despite ongoing challenges.

These integrated efforts had measurable impact. Communities now have reliable access to safe water and sanitation; children benefit from better nutrition and knowledge of hygiene and personal safety; and farming families are better equipped to withstand climate shocks. Throughout these programs, our locally led approach has ensured sustainability. For instance, villagers themselves dug the trenches and installed the water pipeline under our guidance, and local volunteers took leadership roles in child protection sessions.

PmA’s evidence-based, people-first interventions have strengthened resilience and dignity for thousands of crisis-affected people in 2025.

Overall, Promise Aid’s response in 2025 has contributed meaningfully to saving lives, restoring dignity, and building resilience among crisis-affected populations in Myanmar. PmA remains committed to expanding its impact and continuing to stand alongside vulnerable communities in their path toward recovery and stability.

# Budget Analysis FY 2025

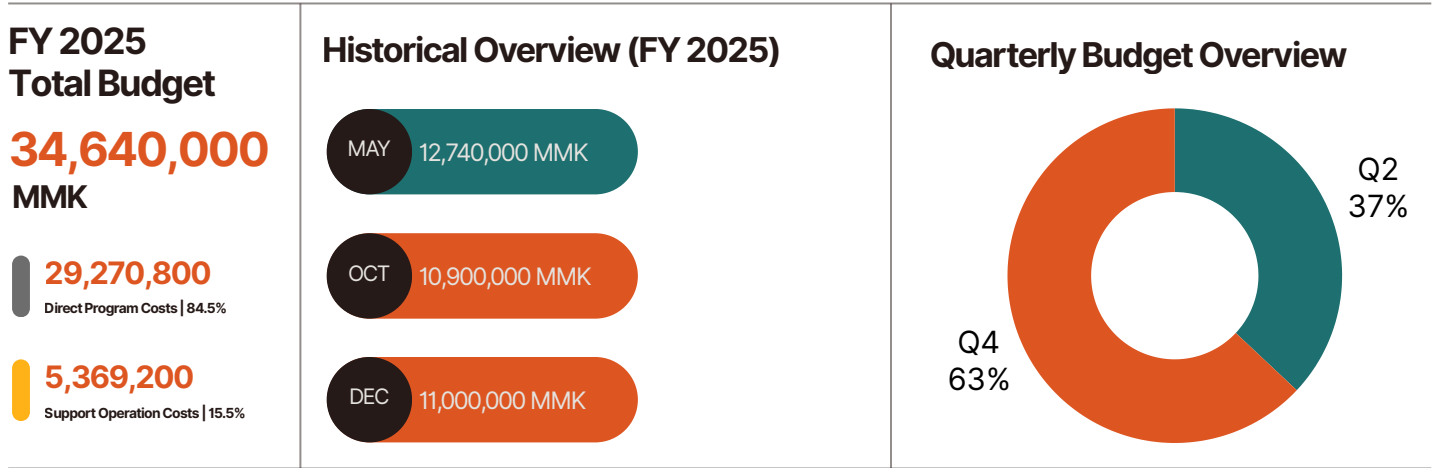
## Executive Summary

The FY2025 budget, funded by private donors, reflects a targeted and multi-sectoral approach to addressing urgent humanitarian needs in South East Region of Myanmar, focusing on food security, WASH, shelter, livelihoods, and protection.

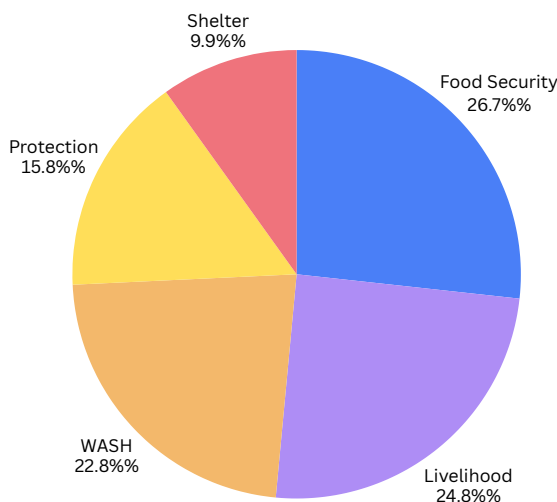
A total budget of MMK 34,640,000 has been allocated, of which MMK 29,270,800 (84.5%) is dedicated to direct program implementation, while MMK 5,369,200 (15.5%) supports operational costs.

### Key Observations

- High program efficiency: 84.5% of funds go directly to beneficiaries.
- Gender and child inclusion: Programs demonstrate inclusive targeting, with a notable focus on women and children.
- Strategic prioritization: Water access, livelihoods, and protection are key investment areas, aligning with urgent community needs.



### Sectoral Budget Highlights



- **Food Assistance (MMK 9.24M | May):** Provides immediate food support to 165 individuals (37 households), addressing urgent food security needs among vulnerable populations.
- **Shelter Repair (MMK 3.5M | May):** Supports 8 households (36 individuals) with essential housing repairs to improve safety and living conditions.
- **WASH Sanitation (MMK 2.4M | October):** Enhances sanitation facilities and hygiene conditions for 112 individuals (20 households), contributing to improved public health outcomes.
- **Livelihood Sector (MMK 8.5M | October):** Invests in income-generating activities for 35 women (35 households), strengthening economic stability and self-reliance.
- **Protection/Shelter (MMK 5.5M | December):** Reaches 394 children, focusing on protection services and safe shelter support to ensure well-being and security.
- **WASH Safe Water (MMK 5.5M | December):** Delivers sustainable access to safe drinking water for 1,037 individuals (219 households), representing the largest beneficiary group and a critical life-saving intervention.

**Coverage and Beneficiaries** Across all sectors, the programs are expected to reach:

- o 1,779 individuals
- o 319 households

## Lessons Learned and Next-Year Priorities

Throughout these initiatives, we gained important lessons on strengthening community resilience and ensuring long-term sustainability. Community engagement proved essential: when villagers led activities such as pipeline installation, it fostered strong ownership and helped ensure ongoing maintenance. Likewise, child protection efforts were more effective when delivered through local volunteers, building trust and cultural relevance.

We also learned that knowledge alone is not sufficient to drive change. Combining awareness with practical resources—such as hygiene kits—significantly improved outcomes. In addition, investing in more durable, climate resilient infrastructure, such as semi-permanent sanitation facilities, delivered better and longer-lasting results. These experiences reinforce the importance of pairing quality inputs with community-led design.

Looking ahead, PromiseAid will focus on scaling and sustaining these gains. In 2026, we will expand successful approaches to new communities while strengthening support in existing areas and deepening local partnerships. Over the 2026–2029 programming cycle, we are committed to advancing community resilience by embedding climate resilient approaches across all WASH interventions.

To ensure sustainability, we will formalize strong O&M frameworks that equip community committees with the technical skills and financial mechanisms needed for independent system management. This marks a clear shift from short-term emergency response toward durable, climate-adaptive solutions aligned with WASH Cluster standards.

Key priorities include:

- Expanding integrated, climate resilient WASH programming
- Strengthening O&M systems for long-term sustainability
- Enhancing coordination with key clusters (Shelter/NFI, Food Security, Health, Protection, Education, Cash)

We will also intensify monitoring and data collection to measure outcomes, improve program quality, and demonstrate impact to donors. Importantly, we will continue to adapt to emerging needs through flexible, evidence-driven programming—ensuring that our work remains relevant, effective, and responsive to the communities we serve.
